

DIVISION C—DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, ENVIRONMENT,
AND RELATED AGENCIES APPROPRIATIONS ACT, 2026

The following statement is an explanation of the effects of Division C, which provides appropriations for the Department of the Interior, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the Forest Service, the Indian Health Service, and related agencies for fiscal year 2026.

The joint explanatory statement accompanying this division is approved and indicates congressional intent. Unless otherwise noted, the language set forth in House Report 119-215 and Senate Report 119-46 carries the same weight as language included in this joint explanatory statement and should be complied with unless specifically addressed to the contrary in this joint explanatory statement.

While some language is repeated for emphasis, it is not intended to negate the language referred to above unless expressly provided herein. In cases where the House Report, Senate Report, or this joint explanatory statement direct the submission of a report, such report is to be submitted to both the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations. Where this joint explanatory statement refers to the Committees or the Committees on Appropriations, unless otherwise noted, this reference is to the House Subcommittee on Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies and the Senate Subcommittee on Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies.

Each department and agency funded in this Act is directed to follow the directions set forth in this Act and the accompanying statement and to not reallocate resources or reorganize activities except as provided herein or otherwise approved by the House and Senate Appropriations Committees through the reprogramming process as referenced in this Act. This joint explanatory statement addresses only those agencies and accounts for which there is a need for greater explanation than provided in the Act itself. Funding levels for appropriations by account, program, and activity, with comparisons to the fiscal year 2025 enacted level and the fiscal year 2026 budget request, can be found in the table at the end of this division.

Unless expressly stated otherwise, any reference to “this Act” or “at the end of this statement” shall be treated as referring only to the provisions of this division.

Aerially Applied Fire Retardant.—The Committees understand the importance of utilizing a variety of wildfire suppression techniques and direct that prior to any action related to hindering the use of such techniques, particularly aerially applied fire retardant, the relevant Agencies confirm that there is an alternative that is effective and available.

Bighorn Sheep.—The Committees are aware that the Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) use the Western Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies' occupied bighorn habitat maps, telemetry data, and recent bighorn observations in conducting Risk of Contact analyses and that risk of contact models are currently being run on a State-wide basis where sufficient data exists. The Committees emphasize the directives included in House Report 119-215 related to bighorn sheep and conducting complete Risk of Contact analyses.

Grizzly Bears.—Not later than 90 days following the enactment of this Act, the Fish and Wildlife Service and the National Park Service are directed to provide an in-depth briefing regarding the implementation of the final rule on the Establishment of a Nonessential Experimental Population of Grizzly Bear in the North Cascades Ecosystem.

The Fish and Wildlife Service is directed to provide an in-depth briefing regarding the development of the draft environmental impact statement under the Endangered Species Act in consideration of the establishment of an experimental population of grizzly bear within the Bitterroot Ecosystem of Montana and Idaho not later than 90 days following the enactment of this Act.

The aforementioned briefings must include the Department's plans to work collaboratively with Tribes, other Federal agencies, States, local communities, and landowners on recovery actions for this species.

The Fish and Wildlife Service is also directed to provide an in-depth briefing regarding barriers and challenges associated with the reissuance of the final rule titled "Endangered and Threatened Wildlife and Plants: Removing the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem Population of Grizzly Bears From the Federal List of Endangered and Threatened Wildlife" (82 Fed. Reg. 30502 (June 30, 2017)) not later than 90 days following the enactment of this Act.

Indian Country Narcotics Reduction Task Force.—The Committees emphasize the directive in House Report 119-215 related to instituting a Narcotics Reduction Task Force aimed to dismantle and disrupt opioid, heroin, and other dangerous drug distribution networks in Indian Country.

Leases.—The Committees direct the agencies to provide notice within 180 days of any official action to terminate a lease or dispose of a federal building. The notice should include proposed closure plans, ongoing consultations with affected stakeholders, and actions to address potential service gaps.

Litigation.—The agreement does not include the language in House Report 119-215 in the third paragraph under the heading "Cost of Litigation and Lack of Transparency."

Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women.—The Committees remain concerned about the crisis of missing, trafficked, and murdered indigenous women that has plagued Native communities. The Committees highlight the support provided within the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Indian Health Service to combat this issue.

Other Items.—The agreement does not include the language in House Report 119-215 under the headings “Public Availability of Data—Permits to Drill” and “Review of Rulemakings.”

Public Access.—To support continued access for hunting, fishing, and recreational shooting on federal land, the Committees direct the Department of the Interior and the Forest Service to notify the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations in advance of any proposed project specifically intending to close an area to recreational shooting, hunting, or fishing on a nonemergency basis of more than 30 days.

Training, Hiring, and Public Lands Education in Alaska.—The Committees reiterate that the directive in the explanatory statement accompanying Public Law 116-94 regarding hiring and conducting annual Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act training by the Department of the Interior and the Forest Service is continued.

Vacant Grazing Allotments.—The Committees direct the Bureau of Land Management and the Forest Service, to the greatest extent practicable, to make vacant grazing allotments available to a holder of a grazing permit or lease when lands covered by the holder of the permit or lease are unusable because of drought or wildfire.

Wildland Fire Consolidation.—The Committees emphasize the narrative included under the heading “Reorganization Proposals—Wildland Fire Management” in House Report 119-215. In lieu of the directive, the Committees include the following direction. The Committees direct the Secretary of Agriculture, in consultation with the Secretary of the Interior, to contract with an independent, non-partisan research organization with expertise in federal land management to conduct a comprehensive study on the feasibility of consolidating wildland fire management operations as proposed in the President’s budget. The Committees expect the study to assess the impacts a consolidation would have on reaching proposed timber targets, continued cohesion between wildland fire management and the hazardous fuels reduction program, continued use of the available red card-certified workforce, and how a new consolidated service would differ from the role the National Interagency Fire Center (NIFC) already plays in coordinating fire response. The study should analyze the impact a consolidation would have on states, localities, and Tribes.

The Committees further direct the Secretaries to consult with the Committees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the Senate prior to the study’s beginning to consider additional aspects of a consolidation the study should address, and the Secretary is directed to submit the study and a

comprehensive response to the findings of the study, including funding estimates, staffing plans, and the legislative proposal required to complete the transfer to such Committees upon its completion.

National Parks and Public Land Legacy Restoration Fund. The Committees direct the Department of the Interior and the Department of Agriculture to implement the project allocations included in the table titled “Allocation of Funds from the National Parks and Public Land Legacy Restoration Fund – Fiscal Year 2025” included in House Report 118-581 for the Bureau of Land Management, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the National Park Service, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, and the U.S. Forest Service, provided that for the U.S. Forest Service, revisions transmitted to the Committees on December 31, 2025 shall apply. The Department of the Interior and the Department of Agriculture are directed to report to the Committees 60 days prior to making any changes to such project allocations and revisions, including the use of contingency funds.

LAND AND WATER CONSERVATION FUND

With enactment of the Great American Outdoors Act (GAOA) (Public Law 116-152), Congress provided a permanent appropriation of \$900,000,000 per year from the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF). Along with other mandatory appropriations, LWCF programs are subject to a 5.7 percent sequestration, with those sequestered amounts becoming available in the subsequent fiscal year. GAOA also mandated that account allocations and detailed project information be proposed by the administration each year through the President's annual budget submission, and that such allocations, following review by the Committees on Appropriations, may be modified through an alternate allocation. The Committees expect compliance with the law and acknowledge the information provided by the U.S. Forest Service as part of its annual budget submission.

A detailed table accompanying this explanatory statement shows the LWCF allocation for fiscal year 2026 by agency, account, activity, and project, including lists of specific U.S. Forest Service Federal land acquisition projects and Forest Legacy Program projects. Additional tables provide details for the reallocation of unobligated balances appropriated in previous years to projects that have been completed, deferred, or terminated and are being transferred to currently viable projects.

Because the fiscal year 2026 budget request did not contain allocations for additional federal land acquisition projects, or detailed information about specific projects for the Department of the Interior, the bill contains language requiring the Department of the Interior to provide a list of individual projects, in the same format and level of detail as prior years, totaling the alternate allocation provided in the table at the end of this explanatory statement for "Federal Land Acquisition Projects" for each federal land management agency, and requires this list to be subject to reprogramming guidelines.

The bill does not include the proposal in the budget request to amend Section 200306 of title 54 to authorize funding for deferred maintenance projects.

The bill includes language requiring the Department of the Interior and U.S. Forest Service to notify the Committee prior to expending LWCF funding on a project within the federal land unit or boundary funded in this, or any prior, allocation table that is different than what is described in the associated project data sheet for the project listed in this, or any prior, allocation table.

The agencies are expected to continue to follow the directions included in the explanatory statement accompanying the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (Public Law 116-260) under General Implementation. The Committees continue to monitor the Department of the Interior and the Forest

Service's progress to ameliorate concerns with the appraisal process and expect regular updates on these efforts.

The Committees note that the U.S. Forest Service and the Department of the Interior have finalized and provided project lists for the expenditure of fiscal year 2025 LWCF federal land acquisition funding. The Committees expect the agencies to execute these projects and direct the agencies to provide quarterly updates on the status of completing these projects. The table titled "Allocation of Funds: Land and Water Conservation Fund Fiscal Year 2025 Revisions" provides an allocation of fiscal year 2025 LWCF federal land acquisition funding that the Department of the Interior project list identified as unallocated.

The Committees support the Forest Service's request to use a portion of unobligated balances to complete the project listed in the table titled "Allocation of Funds: Land and Water Conservation Fund Fiscal Year 2021 Revisions" accompanying this explanatory statement.

REPROGRAMMING GUIDELINES

The following are the procedures governing reprogramming actions for programs and activities funded in the Department of the Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act. The agencies funded in this Act are reminded that these reprogramming guidelines are in effect, and must be complied with, until such time as the Committees modify them through bill or report language.

Definitions. –“Reprogramming,” as defined in these procedures, includes the reallocation of funds from one budget activity, budget line-item, or program area to another within any appropriation funded in this Act. In cases where either the House or Senate Committee on Appropriations report displays an allocation of an appropriation below that level, the more detailed level shall be the basis for reprogramming.

For construction, land acquisition, and forest legacy accounts, a reprogramming constitutes the reallocation of funds, including unobligated balances, from one construction, land acquisition, or forest legacy project to another such project. For this fiscal year, a reprogramming also includes the list of Federal land acquisition projects required to be submitted to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations pursuant to Section 428(a)(2) of this Act.

A reprogramming shall also consist of any significant departure from the program described in the agency's budget justifications. This includes all proposed reorganizations or other workforce actions detailed below which affect a total of 10 staff members or 10 percent of the staffing of an affected program or office, whichever is less, even without a change in funding. Any change to the organization table presented in the budget justification shall also be subject to this requirement.

Agencies are reminded that this agreement continues longstanding General Guidelines for Reprogramming that require agencies funded by this Act to submit reorganization proposals for the Committees' review prior to their implementation. It is noted that such reprogramming guidelines apply to proposed reorganizations, workforce restructure, reshaping, transfer of functions, or bureau-wide downsizing and include closures, consolidations, and relocations of offices, facilities, and laboratories. In addition, no agency shall implement any part of a reorganization that modifies regional or State boundaries for agencies or bureaus that were in effect as of the date of enactment of this Act unless approved consistent with the General Guidelines for Reprogramming procedures specified herein. Any such reprogramming request submitted to the Committees on Appropriations shall include a description of anticipated benefits, including anticipated efficiencies and cost-savings, as well as a description of anticipated personnel impacts and funding changes anticipated to implement the proposal.

General Guidelines for Reprogramming. -

(a) A reprogramming should be made only when an unforeseen situation arises, and then only if postponement of the project or the activity until the next appropriation year would result in actual loss or damage.

(b) Any project or activity, which may be deferred through reprogramming, shall not later be accomplished by means of further reprogramming, but instead, funds should again be sought for the deferred project or activity through the regular appropriations process.

(c) Except under the most urgent situations, reprogramming should not be employed to initiate new programs or increase allocations specifically denied or limited by Congress, or to decrease allocations specifically increased by the Congress.

(d) Reprogramming proposals submitted to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations for approval will be considered as expeditiously as possible, and the Committees remind the agencies that in order to process reprogramming requests, adequate and timely information must be provided.

Criteria and Exceptions.— A reprogramming must be submitted to the Committees in writing prior to implementation if it exceeds \$1,000,000 annually or results in an increase or decrease of more than 10 percent annually in affected programs or projects, whichever amount is less, with the following exceptions:

(a) With regard to the Tribal priority allocations of the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) and Bureau of Indian Education (BIE), there is no restriction on reprogrammings among these programs. However, the Bureaus shall report on all reprogrammings made during a given fiscal year no later than 60 days after the end of the fiscal year.

(b) With regard to the EPA, the Committees do not require reprogramming requests associated with the States and Tribes Partnership Grants or up to a cumulative total of \$5,000,000 from carryover balances among the individual program areas delineated in the Environmental Programs and Management account, with no more than \$1,000,000 coming from any individual program area. No funds, however, shall be reallocated from individual Geographic Programs.

(c) With regard to the National Park Service, the Committees do not require reprogramming requests associated with the park base within the Park Management activity in the Operation of the National Park System Account. The Service is required to brief the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on spending trends for the park base within 60 days of enactment of this Act.

Assessments.—“Assessment” as defined in these procedures shall refer to any charges, reserves, or holdbacks applied to a budget activity or budget line item for costs associated with general agency administrative costs, overhead costs, working capital expenses, or contingencies.

- (a) No assessment shall be levied against any program, budget activity, subactivity, budget line item, or project funded by the Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act unless such assessment and the basis therefor are presented to the Committees in the budget justifications and are subsequently approved by the Committees. The explanation for any assessment in the budget justification shall show the amount of the assessment, the activities assessed, and the purpose of the funds.
- (b) Proposed changes to estimated assessments, as such estimates were presented in annual budget justifications, shall be submitted through the reprogramming process and shall be subject to the same dollar and reporting criteria as any other reprogramming.
- (c) Each agency or bureau which utilizes assessments shall submit an annual report to the Committees, which provides details on the use of all funds assessed from any other budget activity, line item, subactivity, or project.
- (d) In no case shall contingency funds or assessments be used to finance projects and activities disapproved or limited by Congress or to finance programs or activities that could be foreseen and included in the normal budget review process.
- (e) New programs requested in the budget should not be initiated before enactment of the bill without notification to, and the approval of, the Committees. This restriction applies to all such actions regardless of whether a formal reprogramming of funds is required to begin the program.

Quarterly Reports.—All reprogrammings between budget activities, budget line-items, program areas, or the more detailed activity levels shown in this agreement, including those below the monetary thresholds established above, shall be reported to the Committees within 60 days of the end of each quarter and shall include cumulative totals for each budget activity or budget line item, or construction, land acquisition, or forest legacy project.

Land Acquisitions, Easements, and Forest Legacy.—Lands shall not be acquired for more than the approved appraised value, as addressed in section 301(3) of Public Law 91-646, unless such acquisitions are submitted to the Committees on Appropriations for approval in compliance with these procedures.

Land Exchanges.—Land exchanges, wherein the estimated value of the Federal lands to be exchanged is greater than \$1,000,000, shall not be consummated until the Committees have had 30 days

in which to examine the proposed exchange. In addition, the Committees shall be provided advance notification of exchanges valued between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000.

Budget Structure.—The budget activity or line item structure for any agency appropriation account shall not be altered without advance approval of the Committees.

TITLE I – DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR
BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT
MANAGEMENT OF LANDS AND RESOURCES

The bill provides \$1,260,166,000 for the Management of Lands and Resources appropriation. The Bureau is expected to comply with the instructions and requirements at the beginning of this division and in House Report 119-215 and Senate Report 119-46 unless otherwise specified below.

Land Resources.—The Bureau must prioritize the analysis, review, processing, and approval of grazing permits, as well as the administration of grazing permit renewals.

Wild Horse and Burro Management.—The agreement provides \$144,000,000 for wild horse and burro activities, including up to \$11,000,000 for immunocontraceptive vaccine strategies. The bill provides an overall increase of more than \$2,000,000 for wild horse and burro activities and the Committees expect a commensurate increase in immunoecontraceptive vaccine investments. The Bureau is directed to follow the directives included in House Report 119-215 and Senate Report 119-46.

Land Management Priorities.—The bill provides \$3,246,000 for congressionally directed spending in this program. A detailed list of projects is included in the table titled “Interior and Environment Incorporation of Community Project Funding Items/Congressionally Directed Spending Items” accompanying this explanatory statement.

Wildlife and Aquatic Habitat Management.—Within the funding provided for Aquatic Habitat Management, the agreement includes \$2,500,000 for the Colorado River Basin Salinity Control program. Additionally, within the amount provided for Wildlife Habitat Management, the agreement includes \$34,000,000 for Threatened and Endangered Species.

Energy and Minerals.—The Committees direct the Bureau to hire and train dedicated personnel for all activities included under the Energy and Minerals Program to ensure the timely review of all energy projects on Federal lands. The Bureau is directed to provide status reports every 60 days on the execution of funds to fulfill the timely review of all energy projects.

Legacy Wells.—The bill provides no less than \$14,000,000 for legacy well remediation to continue progress toward cleanup of the next cluster of legacy wells in need of remediation.

Realty and Ownership Management. The agreement includes an increase of \$1,008,000 for the Alaska Native Vietnam-era Veterans Allotment Program within the amount for Alaska Conveyance and an increase of \$1,500,000 within the amount for Cadastral, Lands, and Realty Management for the 17(b) program. Within the amounts provided, up to \$500,000 is for the Appraisal and Valuation Services Office for the North Anchorage Land Agreement.

Resource Protection and Maintenance.—The agreement provides \$60,000,000 for Resource Management Planning which includes \$11,000,000 for sage-grouse. It also provides an increase of \$500,000 for Resource Protection and Law Enforcement.

National Conservation Lands.—The agreement provides \$59,135,000, which includes \$11,248,000 for the National Scenic and Historic Trails program.

Aquifer Recharge. The Committees continue to direct the Bureau to work with the State of Idaho to provide appropriate access to Federal lands for the purposes of recharge projects and look forward to the required briefing.

Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument.—The Committees direct the Bureau to provide notification of any review of rulemaking made under the prior Administration related to the Resource Management Plan for the Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument in Utah, and of any alternative resource management plans being considered.

Red River Land Survey.—The Bureau is reminded to follow the directives in House Report 119-215.

OREGON AND CALIFORNIA GRANT LANDS

The bill provides \$115,521,000 for the Oregon and California Grant Lands appropriation. Specific allocations at the activity level are contained in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

RANGE IMPROVEMENTS

The bill provides \$10,000,000 to be derived from public lands receipts and Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act lands grazing receipts.

SERVICE: CHARGES, DEPOSITS, AND FORFEITURES

The bill provides an indefinite appropriation estimated to be \$30,000,000 for Service Charges, Deposits, and Forfeitures.

MISCELLANEOUS TRUST FUNDS

The bill provides an indefinite appropriation estimated to be \$26,000,000 for Miscellaneous Trust Funds.

UNITED STATES FISH AND WILDLIFE SERVICE RESOURCE MANAGEMENT (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The bill provides \$1,451,515,000 for Resource Management. The Service is expected to comply with the instructions and requirements at the beginning of this division and in House Report 119-215 and Senate Report 119-46 unless otherwise specified below. All programs and activities are funded at the amounts enacted in fiscal year 2024 unless otherwise specified below or in the table accompanying this explanatory statement, and account levels are achieved through adjustments in General Program Activities.

Conservation and Restoration.—The agreement provides \$36,822,000 for conservation and restoration activities, which includes \$5,462,000 for Environmental Response and Restoration.

Recovery.—The agreement provides \$110,223,000 for activities in support of the recovery and delisting of threatened and endangered species and includes an increase of \$1,000,000 above the fiscal year 2024 enacted level for Recovery Challenge grants.

National Wildlife Refuge System.—The agreement provides \$522,035,000 for the National Wildlife Refuge System. The Service is reminded to follow the direction in Senate Report 119-46 on refuge operations.

Wildlife and Habitat Management.—The agreement provides funding for Marine National Monuments, including \$1,500,000 to be used consistent with the direction in House Report 119-215 for the Northeast Canyons and Seamounts Marine National Monument.

Visitor Services.—The agreement includes \$74,500,000, which includes funding for the Urban Wildlife Conservation Program and \$2,500,000 for Youth and Careers in Nature.

Refuge Law Enforcement.—The agreement includes \$46,500,000, an increase of \$1,000,000 above the fiscal year 2024 enacted level so the Service can begin to address needs of States with no officers stationed within their boundaries and hire additional officers.

Refuge Maintenance.—The agreement provides \$144,000,000 for refuge maintenance to be allocated by the Service in accordance with need.

Conservation and Enforcement.—The agreement provides \$171,808,000 for other conservation and enforcement programs as described below.

Migratory Bird Management.—The agreement provides \$51,356,000 which includes \$28,694,000 for Conservation and Monitoring; \$5,000,000 for Permits; and \$591,000 for the Federal Duck Stamp program.

Law Enforcement.—The agreement maintains \$91,859,000 for law enforcement activities, including \$8,500,000 for Wildlife Trafficking; and \$910,000 for equipment replacement.

International Affairs.—The agreement maintains \$28,593,000 for International Affairs, which includes \$9,900,000 for International Conservation; \$2,500,000 for Wildlife Trafficking; and \$18,693,000 for International Wildlife Trade, which includes \$8,700,000 for permit modernization and \$793,000 for Wildlife Trafficking.

Fish and Aquatic Conservation.—The agreement provides \$225,775,000 for fish and aquatic conservation programs.

National Fish Hatchery System Operations.—The agreement provides \$79,005,000, which includes funding for Lower Snake River and Columbia River Basin ecosystem restoration infrastructure improvement activities as directed in Senate Report 119-46.

Maintenance and Equipment.—The agreement provides \$24,550,000 for maintenance and equipment to be allocated by the Service in accordance with need.

Habitat Assessment and Restoration.—The agreement provides \$46,114,000, which includes \$11,750,000 to implement the Delaware River Basin Conservation Act.

Population Assessment and Cooperative Management.—The agreement provides \$24,963,000 and maintains all activities except direction on invasive species eradication at the fiscal year 2024 enacted level, with corresponding reductions to General Program Activities.

Aquatic Invasive Species.—The agreement includes \$51,143,000 for aquatic invasive species programs, which includes funding for the implementation of the Invasive Species in Alpine Lakes Pilot program consistent with the direction in House Report 119-215.

Science Support.—The agreement provides \$30,781,000 for Science Support which includes \$21,931,000 for Science Partnerships and \$8,850,000 for Service Science. It provides \$1,931,000 for Gulf Coast ecosystem restoration; and \$3,500,000 for white-nose syndrome.

Stewardship Priorities.—The bill provides \$19,115,000 in congressionally directed spending for stewardship projects to further conservation goals. A detailed list of projects is included in the table titled “Interior and Environment Incorporation of Community Project Funding Items/Congressionally Directed Spending Items” accompanying this explanatory statement.

American Bison.—In lieu of the direction in House Report 119-215, the Committees remind the Service to consult with the impacted States and Tribal governments on any actions regarding the introduction or listing of bison.

The Committees understand that the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service does not intend to reintroduce the American Bison on the Charles M. Russell National Wildlife Refuge and request that it evaluate the potential challenges associated with the reintroduction prior to any decision.

Big Cats Public Safety Act Enforcement.—The Committees expect the Big Cats Public Safety Act report within 120 days of enactment of this Act.

Endangered and Threatened Wildlife.—The Committees encourage the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to review prior actions, rulings, and regulations related to endangered and threatened wildlife and plants, including the Northern Distinct Population Segment and Southern Distinct Population Segment of the Lesser Prairie-Chicken, Northern Long-Eared Bat, Texas Freshwater Mussels, and the North American Wolverine.

Fish Legally Held in Captivity.—The Committees direct the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to provide a report within 180 days of enactment of this Act on any proposed or final rules, guidance, or enforcement under the Endangered Species Act that apply to fish legally held in captivity or controlled environments, including the impacts of such actions on domestic aquaculture operations and wild populations of the same species.

CONSTRUCTION

The bill provides \$14,709,000 for Construction. The agreement continues to support the Service's objective priority-setting process and expects the Service to follow the priority list. The detailed allocation of funding by activity is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

Line-Item Construction Projects.—The bill provides \$1,000,000 in congressionally directed spending for Line-Item Construction Projects. Further detail on this project is provided in the table titled "Interior and Environment Incorporation of Community Project Funding Items/Congressionally Directed Spending Items" accompanying this explanatory statement.

COOPERATIVE ENDANGERED SPECIES CONSERVATION FUND

The bill provides \$22,202,000 in discretionary funding from the Cooperative Endangered Species Conservation Fund for conservation grants, habitat conservation planning grants, and program administration. In addition, the bill allocates \$40,162,000 in mandatory funding from the Land and Water Conservation Fund for species recovery and habitat conservation plan land acquisitions. Detailed tables of funding allocations below the account level are provided in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE FUND

The bill provides \$13,228,000 for payments to counties from the National Wildlife Refuge Fund.

NORTH AMERICAN WETLANDS CONSERVATION FUND

The bill provides \$49,000,000 for the North American Wetlands Conservation Fund.

NEOTROPICAL MIGRATORY BIRD CONSERVATION FUND

The bill provides \$5,000,000 for the Neotropical Migratory Bird Conservation Fund.

MULTINATIONAL SPECIES CONSERVATION FUND

The bill provides \$21,000,000 for the Multinational Species Conservation Fund. The detailed allocation of funding by activity is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

STATE AND TRIBAL WILDLIFE GRANTS

The bill provides \$73,812,000 for State and Tribal Wildlife Grants. The detailed allocation of funding by activity is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

NATIONAL PARK SERVICE
OPERATION OF THE NATIONAL PARK SYSTEM

The bill provides \$2,877,195,000 for Operation of the National Park System (ONPS). For this and all other Service accounts funded in this bill, the Service is expected to comply with the instructions and requirements at the beginning of this division, in House Report 119-215, and in Senate Report 119-46, unless otherwise specified below. Additional details, instructions, and requirements follow below and in the table at the end of this division.

The Service is expected to execute its spending at the levels provided. The Service may not redistribute the allocations in a fiscal year 2026 operating plan. The Service is directed to continue to collaborate with the Committees with the goal of developing an updated methodology to improve the budgeting process.

Additional funding guidance is provided below.

Resource Stewardship.—The bill provides \$398,820,000 for Resource Stewardship, including increased funding for the Partnership Wild & Scenic Rivers program and \$18,856,000 for the National Trails System. The Committees continue the directive provided in the Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying Public Law 117-328 regarding the distribution of funds for the National Networks.

Visitor Services.—The bill provides \$277,635,000 for Visitor Services, including not less than the fiscal year 2024 enacted level for the Indian Youth Service Corps.

Facility Operations and Maintenance.—The agreement recommends \$157,950,000 for cyclic maintenance, and \$148,285,000 for repair and rehabilitation projects.

The agreement shifts the funding requested for Line-Item Construction into repair and rehabilitation projects for fiscal year 2026.

Park Support.—The agreement provides \$652,217,000, with the increase above the fiscal year 2024 level to support limited operations at park units that otherwise do not have base funding.

Additionally, the agreement provides \$12,500,000 for the National Park Foundation.

External Administrative Costs.—The agreement reflects the Service’s plan to decentralize costs except for those programs and operations funded by discretionary amounts in this agreement.

Additional Guidance.—The following additional guidance is included:

Big Cypress National Preserve.—The Committees direct the National Park Service to prioritize upholding trust and treaty responsibilities with Tribal nations, particularly with regards to ensuring access to Tribal lands and ceremonial and burial grounds within the Big Cypress National Preserve.

Caneel Bay.—In lieu of the heading “Caneel Bay Property” in House Report 119-215, the agreement provides the following direction: The Committees understand the interest in ensuring the long-term viability and economic growth of the Service’s redevelopment plans for Caneel Bay. The Committees are aware of concerns about the Service’s RFP and encourage the Service to consider these concerns when making decisions regarding the future of the site. The Committees further direct the Service to provide updates to the Committees regarding how the Service is addressing these concerns and any decisions on this project.

Maintaining National Parks as Federal Lands.—The funding levels for the National Park Service in this agreement continue federal operations and management of park units consistent with prior years and laws applicable to units of the National Park Service. As a result, the agreement does not support the funding levels in the budget request related to proposals for units other than those designated as National Parks. Therefore, the Department shall maintain ownership of Federal lands designated as, or as a part of, a national park unit, a national scenic or national historic trail, or a wild and scenic river and continue to operate such unit, trail, or river as an entity of the National Park Service.

NPS Staffing.—In lieu of the directive under the heading “NPS Staffing” in Senate Report 119-46, the Committees provide only the following direction: Within 60 days of enactment of this Act, and every 60 days thereafter, the Department and the Service are directed to brief the Committees on park operations, to include staffing levels by park and visitor data by park.

Request for Updates.—In lieu of the paragraph titled “National Mall and Memorial Parks” in House Report 119-215 and the last paragraph under National Recreation and Preservation in Senate Report 119-46, the Committees include only the following. The Committees are aware of plans to construct new exhibits at the Thomas Jefferson Memorial and actions related to Executive Orders 13934, 13978, and 14189, and direct the Service to keep the Committees apprised of actions on these items.

Roosevelt-Campobello International Park Commission.—Funding for the Roosevelt Campobello International Park is provided at \$1,956,355. The Service is directed to continue to follow the direction contained in the statement of managers accompanying the Consolidated Appropriation Act, 2016 (Public Law 114-113) concerning the submission of future budget requests for the Roosevelt-Campobello International Park.

NATIONAL RECREATION AND PRESERVATION

The bill provides \$91,596,000 for national recreation and preservation. The amounts recommended by the Committees compared with the budget estimates by activity are shown in the table at the end of this explanatory statement.

The bill provides \$3,597,000 for grants administration and other cultural programs are funded at the fiscal year 2024 enacted level.

Cultural Programs. The Committees recognize the importance of supporting Native culture and arts development, which contributes to maintaining the cultural diversity of the Nation and the cultural survival of the regional indigenous populations. Funding is provided for grants to nonprofit organizations or institutions for the purpose of supporting programs for Native Hawaiian or Alaska Native culture and arts development at a total program level of \$2,750,000.

Heritage Partnership Programs. The bill provides \$30,985,000 for Heritage Partnership Programs. The Committees provide sufficient funding for each heritage area to receive no less than the amount provided in fiscal year 2024. The directive contained in the explanatory statement that accompanied Public Law 116-6 with regards to funding distribution is continued, and the agreement provides an increase for Tier 1 areas to receive the minimum funding level associated with the abovementioned funding distribution direction. Additionally, the Committees provide sufficient funding for the Blackstone River Valley National Heritage Corridor to receive funding within the program at its most recent funding level under the program.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION FUND

The bill provides \$205,059,000 for historic preservation.

Competitive Grants.—The bill provides \$24,000,000 for the African American Civil Rights Grants, equal to the enacted level. Additionally, \$5,000,000 is provided for the History of Equal Rights grants and \$1,250,000 for grants to underrepresented communities.

Paul Buhman Historic Revitalization Grants.—The bill provides \$7,906,000 for historic revitalization grants and retains the directives regarding the distribution of funding included in Senate Report 116-123.

Save America's Treasures.—The bill provides \$25,500,000 for the Save America's Treasures program. The Committees support this program because of its important role in providing preservation

and conservation assistance to nationally significant historical properties and collections, including historic courthouses.

Semiquincentennial Preservation Grants.—The bill provides \$4,907,000 for the Service to assist states in preparing for the upcoming Semiquincentennial celebration and to celebrate the Nation’s history. The Committees retain the directives regarding the distribution of funding included in Senate Report 118-83.

CONSTRUCTION

The bill provides \$88,461,000 for construction.

Line-Item Construction.—As has occurred for several decades, the Committees have consistently provided Line-Item Construction funding in conjunction with further direction on the specific projects funded, which are based on requests and information provided by the Service. At the time of this writing, the Committees have not received a list of requested line-item construction projects for fiscal year 2026. Therefore, the requested funding for Line-Item Construction in fiscal year 2026 has been shifted in the bill to repair and rehabilitation projects within the Operation of the National Park System. The Committees look forward to continuing to support providing funding to the Service for Line-Item Construction projects.

Emergency and Unscheduled Projects.—The bill provides a total of \$3,848,000 in funding for emergency and unscheduled projects within base funding, equal to the enacted level. These funds support the Service in responding after facilities and resources are damaged or destroyed in emergencies.

Hurricane Ridge Day Lodge.—The Committees recognize the immense historical and recreational loss of the Hurricane Ridge Day Lodge due to a fire in 2023. The lodge welcomed 300,000 visitors every year and provided important facilities for Olympic National Park staff. The Committees note that emergency funding has been provided to rebuild the lodge, including temporary facilities to maintain visitor and staff safety during construction due to harsh conditions at the site and high volume of visitors. The Service’s prior estimate for the project was approximately \$80,000,000. The Committees urge the Service to prioritize reconstruction of this center and directs the Service to engage with impacted communities on the Olympic Peninsula, provide robust outreach to those communities, and continue keeping the Committees informed of construction timelines.

CENTENNIAL CHALLENGE

The bill provides \$5,000,000 for the Centennial Challenge matching grant program.

UNITED STATES GEOLOGICAL SURVEY
SURVEYS, INVESTIGATIONS, AND RESEARCH
(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The bill provides \$1,420,433,000 for Surveys, Investigations, and Research of the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS, or the Survey). The Survey is expected to comply with the instructions and requirements at the beginning of this division and in House Report 119-215 and Senate Report 119-46 unless otherwise specified below. While some language is repeated for emphasis, it is not intended to negate the language referred to above unless expressly provided herein. A detailed allocation of funding is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

Species Management Research Program.—The agreement provides \$60,348,000 and maintains funding at the fiscal year 2024 enacted level for the U.S. National Phenology Network. The agreement restates the direction for interstate and/or international fishery commissions and directs a briefing within 90 days of enactment of this Act.

Land Management Research Program.—The agreement provides \$50,000,000 and continues activities in the Chesapeake Bay and all priority geographic landscapes and ecosystems, including the Everglades and the Arctic, at the fiscal year 2024 enacted level.

Biological Threats and Invasive Species Research Program.—The agreement provides \$45,500,000, including funding for research on Coral Disease and phytoplankton changes in the Great Lakes at the fiscal year 2024 enacted level. The Committees maintain \$11,000,000 for invasive carp research.

Climate Adaptation Science Centers and Land Change Science Program.—The agreement provides \$81,780,000, of which \$17,665,000 is for Land Change Science. The Committees direct the Survey to prioritize funding to the Regional Centers and expedite processing of funds to university-led consortia.

Cooperative Research Units Program.—The agreement includes \$28,206,000 for Cooperative Research Units (CRUs) and does not include the direction in House Report 119-215 and Senate Report 119-46.

Energy and Mineral Resources.—The agreement provides \$104,664,000 for Energy and Mineral Resources, of which \$68,729,000 is for Mineral Resources which includes \$1,500,000 to support programs through state university partnerships. The agreement maintains funding at the fiscal year 2024

enacted level for the critical minerals Earth Mapping Resources Initiative (Earth MRI) and critical mineral mapping efforts in Alaska. Energy Resources is funded at \$35,935,000.

Natural Hazards.—The agreement provides \$200,131,000 for the Natural Hazards Program, including \$94,901,000 for earthquake hazards. Within this funding, \$34,850,000 is provided for continued development and expansion of the ShakeAlert West Coast earthquake early warning (EEW) system, including to develop a Technical Implementation Plan to determine the buildout required for ShakeAlert capabilities in other key western states, including Nevada. The agreement also includes no less than \$2,000,000 to be used to begin expansion of the ShakeAlert EEW system to Alaska, in accordance with the direction in Senate Report 119-46.

The agreement continues funding at the fiscal year 2024 enacted level for the national seismic hazard map and for regional seismic networks, including operating and maintaining USArray stations.

The agreement provides \$37,500,000 for volcano hazards, including funding for the National Volcano Early Warning and Monitoring System (NVEWS) and Volcanic Hazard Assessments at the fiscal year 2024 enacted level.

The agreement includes \$14,532,000 for Landslide Hazards, which includes funding at the fiscal year 2024 enacted level for the Cooperative Landslide Hazards and Assessment Competitive Grant Program. The agreement increases Actionable Landslide Hazard Data and Science funding by \$250,000 above the fiscal year 2024 enacted level, and provides funding for Landslide Hazard Assessments in Alaska, as outlined in the Senate Report 119-46.

The agreement provides \$5,198,000 for Geomagnetism, including no less than the fiscal year 2024 enacted level for the magnetotelluric survey to advance the collection of magnetotelluric observations of the Earth's naturally occurring electric and magnetic fields in the U.S. regions.

Water Resources.—The agreement provides \$288,772,000 for Water Resources and maintains \$66,529,000 for activities associated with the Cooperative Matching Funds. Water Availability and Use Science is funded at \$67,296,000 and includes Open ET at the fiscal year 2024 enacted level. The Committees encourage the Survey to dedicate resources to enhance cooperation with western state water resource agencies, consistent with the direction in Senate Report 119-46.

USGS is directed to continue its efforts to establish the Hydrologic Science Talent Pipeline and maintain the fiscal year 2024 enacted funding level within the Water Availability and Use Science Program and the National Groundwater and Streamflow Information Program.

The agreement provides funding within the Water Availability and Use Science Program for the training and development program outlined in House Report 119-215.

Groundwater and Streamflow Information is funded at \$110,976,000, which includes \$31,000,000 for Federal Priority Streamgages and \$30,000,000 for Next Generation Water Observing

Systems. The agreement maintains funding for Ohio River Supergages and Streamgages for Transboundary Rivers, including the Unuk River gage and Kootenai watershed and the Committees encourage the Survey to continue to expand its streamgage monitoring of transboundary watersheds, consistent with the direction in Senate Report 119-46.

Special Initiatives.—The agreement provides an additional amount of \$2,250,000 in congressionally directed spending for Special Initiatives projects. Further detail on these projects is located in the table titled “Interior and Environment Incorporation of Community Project Funding Items/Congressionally Directed Spending Items” accompanying this explanatory statement.

Core Science Systems.—The agreement provides \$276,127,000.

The National Land Imaging program is funded at \$116,206,000 which includes \$95,334,000 for Satellite Operations and \$2,600,000 for the Remote Sensing State Grants program. The Committees reiterate the direction in Senate Report 119-46.

The National Geospatial program is funded at \$91,421,000, including \$43,905,000 for the 3D Elevation Program (3DEP), which maintains funding for the National Digital Trails project at the fiscal year 2024 enacted level. The agreement includes \$1,000,000 for the 3D Hydrography Program (3DHP).

Science Support.—The agreement provides \$73,683,000, which includes \$56,708,000 for Administration and Management, and \$16,975,000 is for Information Services.

The bill provides \$191,128,000 for the Ocean Energy Management appropriation, which is partially offset through the collection of rental receipts and cost recovery fees totaling \$58,000,000, resulting in a net appropriation of \$133,128,000. Specific allocations at the activity level are contained in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

In lieu of the direction in House Report 119-215 and Senate Report 119-46 under the first and second paragraphs, respectively, the Committees provide only the following direction: The Committees direct the Bureau to provide status reports every 60 days on the execution of funds to fulfill its legally required responsibilities for all offshore energy activities.

Additionally, the Committees note that any briefing requirements should include the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations, in addition to others listed.

Marine Minerals. When carrying out the directive in Senate Report 119-46 under the heading "Marine Minerals", the Committees direct that before lease sales take place, the Bureau will complete all statutorily required work and will consult with local communities.

BUREAU OF SAFETY AND ENVIRONMENTAL ENFORCEMENT OFFSHORE SAFETY AND ENVIRONMENTAL ENFORCEMENT

The bill provides \$196,751,000 for the Offshore Safety and Environmental Enforcement appropriation. This amount is partially offset through the collection of rental receipts, cost recovery fees and inspection fees totaling \$65,000,000, resulting in a net appropriation of \$131,751,000. Specific allocations at the activity level are contained in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

OIL SPILL RESEARCH

The bill provides \$15,099,000 for Oil Spill Research.

OFFICE OF SURFACE MINING RECLAMATION AND ENFORCEMENT REGULATION AND TECHNOLOGY

The bill provides \$117,575,000 for the Regulation and Technology appropriation.

ABANDONED MINE RECLAMATION FUND

The bill provides \$166,975,000 for the Abandoned Mine Reclamation Fund appropriation. Of the funds provided, \$32,975,000 shall be derived from the Abandoned Mine Reclamation Fund and \$134,000,000 shall be derived from the General Fund.

Abandoned Mine Land Economic Revitalization (AMLER). The bill provides a total of \$134,000,000 for direct payments to States and federally recognized Indian Tribes for the reclamation of abandoned mine lands in conjunction with economic and community development and reuse goals. For fiscal year 2026, \$88,500,000 shall be divided equally between the three Appalachian States with the largest unfunded needs for the reclamation of Priority 1 and Priority 2 sites as delineated in the AML Inventory System; \$33,750,000 shall be divided equally between the next three Appalachian States with the largest unfunded needs for the reclamation of Priority 1 and Priority 2 sites as delineated in the AML Inventory System; and \$11,750,000 shall be for direct payments to federally recognized Indian Tribes. The detailed allocation of funding by activity is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

Appalachian Regional Reforestation Initiative (ARRI). The agreement provides no less than \$500,000 for ARRI to promote effective reforestation of mined lands.

INDIAN AFFAIRS BUREAU OF INDIAN AFFAIRS OPERATION OF INDIAN PROGRAMS (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

The bill provides \$1,933,200,000 for Operation of Indian Programs. All programs and subactivities included are continued at the fiscal year 2024 enacted level unless otherwise specified below or reflected in the table accompanying this report.

The Committees reiterate the report directive in Senate Report 119-46 related to staffing and a service transition plan.

Tribal Government.—The agreement includes \$398,987,000 for Tribal Government, to include \$39,190,000 for Road Maintenance, of which \$1,100,000 is provided for school bus roads.

Human Services. The agreement includes \$168,747,000 for Human Services, including \$56,454,000 for Social Services, of which \$3,500,000 is for Tribes that have not been able to receive BIA

social services activities. Within the amount provided for Human Services, \$13,439,000 is provided for the Housing Improvement Program and \$16,903,000 for the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA), including to support ICWA's mandate and attorney assistance in Child in Need of Assistance (CINA) cases.

Trust-Natural Resources Management. - The agreement includes \$327,649,000 for Trust-Natural Resources Management, which includes \$13,985,000 for Natural Resources, including to support pilot projects and programs for Alaska subsistence and Indian Youth Service Corps. The agreement includes \$51,000,000 for Rights Protection Implementation, including to support off-reservation hunting, fishing, and gathering rights supported by this program. Within the amount provided for Rights Protection Implementation, \$7,292,000 is included for the Pacific Salmon Treaty. The recommendation also includes funding to support the Columbia River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission Columbia River in-lieu sites law enforcement, in-lieu sites operations and maintenance, fisheries management, and construction to support implementation of the Columbia River Basin Settlement Agreement, and Salmon and Steelhead Inventory. The agreement includes \$19,044,000 for the Tribal Management/Development Program, including \$2,023,000 for the Inter-Tribal Buffalo Council, \$427,000 for the Native American Fish and Wildlife Society, and \$1,000,000 for law enforcement.

The recommendation includes \$41,438,000 for Agriculture and Range, including \$14,291,000 for Invasive Species, of which \$2,000,000 is for European Green Crab and the Committees await the related briefing outlined in Senate Report 119-46.

The agreement includes \$62,887,000 for Forestry and restates the directive related to wildfire suppression and rehabilitation resources outlined in Senate Report 119-46.

The recommendation includes \$23,751,000 for Fish, Wildlife, and Parks, including the enacted level of funding to support fish hatcheries.

Trust-Real Estate Services. - The recommendation includes \$169,887,000 for Trust-Real Estate Services, including \$17,140,000 for Probate. The Committees remain concerned with the administrative burden and length of time it takes to probate Tribal citizens' assets. The Committees remind the Bureau of the reporting directive included in Senate Report 119-46.

Public Safety and Justice. - The recommendation includes \$570,059,000, an increase of \$14,500,000 above the fiscal year 2024 enacted level, including \$284,152,000 for Criminal Investigations and Police Services. Within the total provided to Criminal Investigations and Police Services, \$66,000,000 is provided to support activities as a result of the *McGirt v. Oklahoma* decision and \$1,296,000 is for the National School Resource Officer Program. Within available funds, the agreement provides support for an expanded Opioid Reduction Task Force, a Narcotics Reduction Task Force, as outlined in House Report 119-215.

The Committees reiterate their concern with reports of international criminal organizations targeting Tribal communities and emphasize the directives included in House Report 119-215 and Senate Report 119-46 related to combatting these illegal criminal organizations and how these organizations contribute to violent crime, drug trafficking, and the crisis of missing and murdered indigenous women. The Committees emphasize the directives included in House Report 119-215 and Senate Report 119-46 on Public Safety and Justice and International Drug Trafficking.

The recommendation includes \$27,094,000 for Law Enforcement Special Initiatives, including \$18,500,000 for the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women Initiative, \$2,000,000 over the fiscal year 2024 enacted level. The Committees emphasize the work that has been done to address this crisis and direct the Bureau to work with Tribal and Federal law enforcement agencies to support this initiative, as directed in House Report 119-215 and Senate Report 119-46. The Bureau should also provide an update on law enforcement vacancies, the number of law enforcement background checks pending, and how it is expediting investigations as directed in Senate Report 119-46. The Committees applaud the work of the Missing and Murdered Unit's commitment to addressing violence in Indian country through Operation Not Forgotten.

The recommendation includes \$5,663,000 for the Indian Police Academy, including a \$500,000 increase over the fiscal year 2024 enacted level for advanced training activities in the Great Plains.

The Committees reiterate concern for addressing the needs of Tribal governments for law enforcement and courts in Public Law 83-280 (P.L. 280) States, and that there are Tribes subject to P.L. 280 that are currently providing law enforcement services without any funding from BIA. The Committees remain supportive of comprehensive Tribal consultation with Tribes in P.L. 280 States to explore the available flexibilities that would enable these Tribes to utilize their existing and future resources more effectively for law enforcement purposes given the need to improve public safety within their communities.

The Committees emphasize the reporting directives for P.L. 280 and Criminal Investigation and Police Services in House Report 119-215 and Senate Report 119-46.

Community and Economic Development.—The recommendation includes \$32,746,000 for Community and Economic Development and maintains the fiscal year 2024 enacted level of funding to carry out activities related to the NATIVE Act and for Native businesses and entrepreneurs to develop and grow their businesses through the Indian Business Incubator Program. Within the funding provided, \$13,686,000 is provided for the Job Placement and Training Program, \$6,500,000 for Language Immersion Grants, as well as \$2,200,000 for a Native American Technology and Manufacturing Grant Pilot Program as outlined in House Report 119-215.

Executive Direction and Administrative Services. The recommendation includes \$256,634,000. The Committees reiterate the directive related to the consideration of establishing an Indian Boarding School Commission.

Tiwahe.—The recommendation provides \$44,583,000 to continue funding existing Tiwahe program sites.

INDIAN LAND CONSOLIDATION

The bill provides \$4,000,000 for Indian Land Consolidation.

CONTRACT SUPPORT COSTS

The bill provides an indefinite appropriation for contract support costs, estimated to be \$350,000,000 in fiscal year 2026.

PAYMENTS FOR TRIBAL LEASES

The bill provides an indefinite appropriation for payments under section 105(l) of the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act, estimated to be \$53,000,000 in fiscal year 2026.

CONSTRUCTION (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The bill provides \$135,780,000 for Construction. The detailed allocation of funding is included in the table at the end of this explanatory statement. All programs and subactivities included are continued at

the fiscal year 2024 enacted level unless otherwise specified below or reflected in the table accompanying this report.

Public Safety and Justice Construction. The bill provides \$47,791,000 for all Public Safety and Justice Construction, an increase of \$2,000,000 over the fiscal year 2024 enacted level. The Committees emphasize the directives and guidance included in House Report 119-215 and Senate Report 119-46 regarding advanced training and look forward to receiving the requested report and justification.

The funding provided for Public Safety and Justice Construction includes at least the fiscal year 2024 enacted level for Facilities Replacement/Construction Projects, Employee Housing, Facilities Improvement and Repair, Fire Safety Coordination, and Fire Protection.

The Committees emphasize the directives included and plan requested in Senate Report 119-46 on the construction of adult detention centers that were previously awarded and direction on the distribution of unobligated funds.

Resources Management. The recommendation includes \$65,694,000 for Resources Management, including to support Dam Safety, \$2,758,000 for Engineering and Supervision and \$671,000 for federal power compliance.

INDIAN LAND AND WATER CLAIM SETTLEMENTS AND MISCELLANEOUS PAYMENTS TO INDIANS

The bill provides \$976,000 for Indian Land and Water Claim Settlements and Miscellaneous Payments to Indians. The Committees direct the Bureau to provide a briefing within 90 days of enactment of this Act on all settlement obligations and proposals for such obligations.

INDIAN GUARANTEED LOAN PROGRAM ACCOUNT

The bill provides \$13,329,000 for the Indian Guaranteed Loan Program Account to facilitate business investments in Indian Country.

**BUREAU OF INDIAN EDUCATION
OPERATION OF INDIAN EDUCATION PROGRAMS**

The bill includes \$1,131,617,000 for Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) Operation of Indian Education Programs. All programs and subactivities included are continued at the fiscal year 2024 enacted level unless otherwise specified below or reflected in the table accompanying this report.

The agreement outlines certain funding levels in the detailed table accompanying this joint explanatory statement.

Elementary Secondary Programs (forward funded). The bill includes \$706,185,000 for Elementary/Secondary Programs, including \$481,636,000 for ISEP Formula Funds to support Education Program Enhancements, including Native Language Immersion, Student Transportation, and Grant Support Costs.

Post Secondary Programs (forward funded). The agreement provides \$127,407,000 for Post Secondary Programs, including \$30,325,000 for Haskell & SIPI.

Within 120 days of enactment of this Act, BIE, in cooperation with the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Indian Affairs, is directed to provide the report and information specified in House Report 119-215 and Senate Report 119-46 on the potential benefits and implications of transferring governance authority of Haskell to its Tribally elected Board of Regents.

Salaries. The Committees reiterate the directives in Senate Report 119-46 regarding Salaries and FERS Eligibility at BIE Tribally Controlled Schools as it pertains to teacher recruitment and retention.

EDUCATION CONSTRUCTION

Education Construction. The bill provides \$234,725,000 for schools and related facilities within the BIE system.

**BUREAU OF TRUST FUNDS ADMINISTRATION
FEDERAL TRUST PROGRAMS
(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)**

The agreement provides \$100,009,000 for the Bureau of Trust Funds Administration. Bill language specifies the funding for settlement support.

DEPARTMENTAL OFFICES
 OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY
 DEPARTMENTAL OPERATIONS
 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The bill provides \$131,012,000 for the Office of the Secretary, Departmental Operations appropriation. Specific allocations at the activity level are contained in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

Office of Navajo and Hopi Indian Relocation Closeout. The Committees remain committed to the orderly and timely closure of the Office of Navajo and Hopi Indian Relocation (ONHIR). To facilitate this transition, the Committees direct the Department of the Interior, including the Interior Business Center (IBC), to work with stakeholders and the Department of Justice on addressing all outstanding administrative duties, fiduciary responsibilities, land management and livestock obligations of ONHIR that are necessary to support its final closure. The Department is directed to brief the Committees on Appropriations within 90 days of enactment of this Act on progress toward this goal. The agreement includes \$7,000,000 to support these transition efforts.

Vehicle Fleet. In lieu of the directives in House Report 119-215 related to a standard-compliant telematics pilot program, the Committees direct the Secretary to provide a briefing assessing the potential operational, cost, and efficiency benefits associated with implementing such a program.

INSULAR AFFAIRS
 ASSISTANCE TO TERRITORIES

The bill provides \$117,217,000 for Assistance to Territories. The detailed allocation of funding is included in the table at the end of this explanatory statement.

COMPACT OF FREE ASSOCIATION

The bill provides \$813,000 for Compact of Free Association. A detailed table of funding allocations below the account level is provided at the end of this explanatory statement.

OFFICE OF THE SOLICITOR
SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The bill provides \$84,181,000 for the Salaries and Expenses appropriation within the Office of the Solicitor. Specific allocations at the activity level are contained in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

OFFICE OF INSPECTOR GENERAL
SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The bill provides \$65,000,000 for the Office of Inspector General to be derived by transfer from unobligated balances of amounts previously appropriated for the Office.

DEPARTMENT-WIDE PROGRAMS
WILDLAND FIRE MANAGEMENT
(INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

The bill provides \$1,147,171,000 for the Department of the Interior Wildland Fire Management, including \$526,064,000 for Preparedness to support continued execution of the new pay table authorized by Public Law 119-4 as a permanent fix to ensure the Federal agencies' ability to recruit and retain wildland firefighters and maintain current firefighter capacity, and including \$10,000,000 for Fire Facilities, of which not less than \$4,000,000 is to support the Fire Fighter Housing Improvement Initiative. The detailed allocation of funding by activity is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

**WILDFIRE SUPPRESSION OPERATIONS RESERVE FUND
(INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)**

The bill includes \$370,000,000 for the Wildfire Suppression Operations Reserve Fund.

CENTRAL HAZARDOUS MATERIALS FUND

The bill provides \$9,031,000 for the Central Hazardous Materials Fund appropriation.

**ENERGY COMMUNITY REVITALIZATION PROGRAM
(INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)**

The agreement provides \$4,700,000 for the Energy Community Revitalization Program, including \$2,250,000 for State grants for western States in accordance with the specifications outlined in House Report 119-215. The detailed allocation of funding is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

**NATURAL RESOURCE DAMAGE ASSESSMENT AND RESTORATION
NATURAL RESOURCE DAMAGE ASSESSMENT FUND**

The bill provides \$6,500,000 for the Natural Resource Damage Assessment Fund appropriation. The Committees have consolidated the activity lines in the detail table accompanying this explanatory statement. However, the congressional budget justification should continue to provide a detailed spend plan and report the previous year's spending by the four historic activity lines.

WORKING CAPITAL FUND

The bill provides \$90,775,000 for the Working Capital Fund appropriation.

OFFICE OF NATURAL RESOURCES REVENUE

The bill provides \$159,850,000 for the Natural Resources Revenue appropriation. The Committees direct the Department to distribute revenues from operations in the Gulf of America Region in a manner consistent with Public Law 109-432.

GENERAL PROVISIONS, DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

The bill includes various legislative provisions affecting the Department in Title I of the bill, "General Provisions, Department of the Interior". The provisions are:

Section 101 provides Secretarial authority for the intra-bureau transfer of program funds for expenditures in cases of emergencies when all other emergency funds are exhausted.

Section 102 provides for the Department-wide expenditure or transfer of funds by the Secretary in the event of actual or potential emergencies including forest fires, range fires, earthquakes, floods, volcanic eruptions, storms, oil spills, grasshopper and Mormon cricket outbreaks, and surface mine reclamation emergencies.

Section 103 provides for the use of appropriated funds by the Secretary for contracts, rental cars and aircraft, telephone expenses, and other certain services.

Section 104 provides for the expenditure or transfer of funds from the Bureau of Indian Affairs and Bureau of Indian Education, and the Bureau of Trust Funds Administration, for Indian trust management and reform activities.

Section 105 permits the redistribution of Tribal priority allocation and Tribal base funds to alleviate funding inequities.

Section 106 authorizes the acquisition of lands for the purpose of operating and maintaining facilities that support visitors to Ellis, Governors, and Liberty Islands.

Section 107 continues Outer Continental Shelf inspection fees to be collected by the Secretary of the Interior.

Section 108 provides the Secretary of the Interior with authority to enter into multiyear cooperative agreements with nonprofit organizations for long-term care of wild horses and burros.

Section 109 addresses the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's responsibilities for mass marking of salmonid stocks.

Section 110 allows the Bureau of Indian Affairs and Bureau of Indian Education to more efficiently and effectively perform reimbursable work.

Section 111 provides for the establishment of a Department of the Interior Experienced Services Program.

Section 112 requires funds to be available for obligation and expenditure not later than 60 days after the date of enactment.

Section 113 provides the Secretary of the Interior the ability to transfer funds among and between the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Bureau of Indian Education.

Section 114 provides funding for the Payments in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) program.

Section 115 directs notification of any deviation in procedure or equipment.

Section 116 allows the National Park Service to convey lands for purposes of transportation and recreation for a specific project.

Section 117 authorizes Tribally controlled schools access to interagency motor vehicles in the same manner as if performing activities under the Indian Self Determination and Education Assistance Act.

Section 118 provides the Secretary of the Interior with certain pay authority for the Appraisal and Valuation Services Office.

Section 119 addresses the issuance of rules for sage-grouse.

Section 120 authorizes the National Park Service to retain up to 7 percent of State Conservation Grants to provide matching grants to support state program administrative costs.

Section 121 extends the authorization of deposits into the Historic Preservation Fund.

Section 122 provides the Secretary of the Interior the ability to authorize and execute agreements to achieve operating efficiencies.

Section 123 amends the emergency law enforcement ceiling.

Section 124 extends the contribution authority provided in previous years.

Section 125 requires the Bureau of Land Management to prioritize completion of a validity determination for any mining claims located within the area covered by Public Land Order 7921.

Section 126 extends the operation of an existing hydroelectric project in California.

Section 127 authorizes field unit local hiring.

Section 128 makes technical changes to grant application requirement under the American Indian, Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian Culture and Art Development Act.

TITLE II – ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY

The bill provides \$8,816,888,000 for the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The Agency is expected to comply with the instructions and requirements at the beginning of this division, in House Report 119-215, and Senate Report 119-46, unless otherwise specified below. Additional details, instructions, and requirements follow below and in the table at the end of this division.

In lieu of the paragraph titled “Reprogramming” in Senate Report 119-46, the Committees note that the Agency must follow the reprogramming directives in Section 421 of this Act and in the front matter of this explanatory statement.

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

For Science and Technology programs, the bill provides \$744,195,000. The bill transfers \$17,607,000 from the Hazardous Substance Superfund account to this account. The agreement provides the following specific funding levels and direction:

Clean Air.—All activities are funded at the amounts enacted in fiscal year 2024, with reductions taken consistent with current Agency structure, except as specified below.

The Committees recognize the important role that Clean Air Allowance Trading Programs play in improving air quality and reducing pollution and note the Science Advisory Board panel’s review of the Clean Air Allowance Trading Program. The Committees direct the Agency to continue this effort, and provide \$5,260,000 to modernize the Clean Air Status and Trends Network [CASTNet].

Research: Air and Energy.—Within available funds, the Committees continue funding for the study under the heading “Partnership Research” contained in the explanatory statement of Public Law 115-141.

Research: Chemical Safety for Sustainability.—The agreement provides \$119,744,000.

Research: National Priorities.—The bill provides \$27,253,000 for Research: National Priorities, including \$9,500,000 for extramural research grants, independent of the Science to Achieve Results (STAR) grant program, as specified under this heading in Senate Report 119-46 and House Report 119-215.

The Committees support the Agency’s effort to prioritize new federal research that will help farmers, ranchers, and rural communities manage P-90 impacts in agricultural settings and communities and provide \$9,000,000 to continue that work. The Agency is directed to follow the directives as specified under this heading in House Report 119-215.

Consistent with House Report 119-215, the agreement provides \$2,475,000 for advancing full scale applied research and testing capabilities to address threats to drinking water and associated infrastructure at Water Security Test Bed facilities.

The bill provides \$6,278,000 for Congressionally Directed Spending grants. Further detail on the projects is located in the table titled “Interior and Environment Incorporation of Community Project Funding Items/Congressionally Directed Spending Items” accompanying this explanatory statement.

Research: Safe and Sustainable Water Resources. Of the funds provided, up to \$5,000,000 shall be used for grants under section 2007 of America’s Water Infrastructure Act (P.L. 115-270).

Ensure Safe Water. This joint agreement includes only the following: the Agency is encouraged to continue to implement Unregulated Contaminant Monitoring Rule 6 and consider additional contaminants, including metabolites, for inclusion.

Additional Guidance.—The following additional guidance is included:

Harmful Algal Blooms. The agreement provides \$6,000,000 for research on harmful algal blooms in accordance with House Report 119-215 and Senate Report 119-46.

Integrated Risk Information System (IRIS) Program.—In lieu of the directives under the heading “IRIS Program Integrity” in House Report 119-215, the Committees provide the following direction. The Committees are aware that the IRIS program has been listed on GAO’s High-Risk List since 2009. Therefore, the Committees direct the Agency to address the concerns outlined in the GAO High-Risk List report and to ensure the Agency is utilizing best available science in its approach to chemical risk assessment and management.

Ethylene Oxide.—The Committees are aware that NASEM is currently reviewing the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality’s Ethylene Oxide Development Support Document and expect that the Agency will evaluate the results of that review prior to making any regulatory decisions.

Landfill Emissions Research. Consistent with direction in the explanatory statement accompanying Public Law 117-328, the bill provides the enacted level for landfill emissions research.

eRINs. In lieu of the paragraph titled “Electric Pathways” in Senate report 119-46, the Committees direct the Agency to provide a briefing within 90 days of enactment of this Act on the Agency’s proposed actions related to eRINs within the Renewable Fuel Standards program.

Cellulosic Biofuels. Not later than 30 days after the date of enactment of this Act, the Committees direct the Agency to submit to the Committees a report related to fuel derived from waste plastic or waste tires, including any plan the Agency may have to qualify such waste as cellulosic biofuel under section 211(o) of the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7545(o)). In preparing the report, the Agency shall consult with relevant stakeholders and consider incorporating any input from such stakeholders.

Science to Achieve Results (STAR) Grants. The agreement provides funds to continue the STAR program and directs the Agency to distribute grants consistent with fiscal year 2024.

Statutory Requirements.—In lieu of the direction provided under the paragraph titled “Office of Research and Development” in Senate Report 119-46, the Committees acknowledge that the Agency published an Addendum to its fiscal year 2026 budget request related to consolidations, reorganizations, realignments, and other transfers of resources. The Committees expect that the Agency’s mission and all statutory obligations will continue, and that any current or future budgetary requests related to such actions are subject to and contingent upon compliance with applicable reprogramming and notification requirements.

Wildfire Smoke Research. The Agency is directed to follow the guidance in the joint explanatory statement accompanying Public Law 117-103.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROGRAMS AND MANAGEMENT

For Environmental Programs and Management, the bill provides \$3,114,671,000. The agreement provides the following specific funding levels and direction:

Clean Air. The agreement maintains the enacted level for the Agency's wood stove certification and testing standards work. The Agency is directed to use the base funding to increase its staffing and other required efforts to support the wood stove certification and testing program. The Agency is further directed to brief the Committees within 60 days of enactment of this Act on improvements the Agency plans to make to the program and how it will better communicate with State and local stakeholders.

Wildfire Smoke Grant Funding. The Committees commend EPA for its efforts through the AirNow Fire and Smoke Map to better forecast and communicate the impact of wildfire smoke on communities. The Committees are concerned that air quality monitors are not currently distributed equitably across impacted communities. The Committees encourage EPA to expand its support for wildfire smoke monitoring, including improving instrumentation, technical assistance, and outreach, using the resources provided in this bill with a focus on traditionally underserved or under-monitored communities. The bill continues funding in State and Tribal Assistance Grants for wildfire smoke-related activities.

Enforcement. - The bill provides \$30,000,000 to continue providing grants within this program area and includes certain distribution requirements.

Environmental Protection: National Priorities.—The bill provides \$30,700,000, for a competitive grant program for qualified non-profit organizations to provide technical assistance for improved water quality or safe drinking water, adequate waste-water to small systems, or individual private well owners. The Agency shall provide \$26,000,000 for Grassroots Rural and Small Community Water Systems Assistance Act (Public Law 114-98), for activities specified under section 1442(e) of the Safe Drinking Water Act (42 U.S.C. 300j-1(e)(8)). The Agency is also directed to provide \$3,450,000 for grants to qualified not-for-profit organizations for technical assistance for individual private well owners, with priority given to organizations that currently provide technical and educational assistance to individual private well owners. The Agency is directed to provide on a national and multi-State regional basis, \$1,250,000 for grants to qualified organizations for the sole purpose of providing on-site training and technical assistance for wastewater systems. The Agency shall require each grantee to provide a minimum 10 percent match, including in-kind contributions. The Agency is directed to allocate funds to grantees within 180 days of enactment of this Act.

Geographic Programs.—The bill provides \$690,202,000 as described in the table at the end of this division, and includes the following direction:

Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI). The agreement provides funding to the GLRI Distinct Tribal Program at no less than \$16,500,000.

Chesapeake Bay. From within the amount provided, at least \$11,000,000 is for nutrient and sediment removal grants, at least \$11,000,000 is for small watershed grants to control polluted runoff from urban, suburban, and agricultural lands, and at least \$9,000,000 is for State-based implementation in the most effective basins.

Puget Sound.—The agreement provides \$56,000,000 for the Puget Sound program and continues the direction contained in the explanatory statement accompanying Public Law 118-42.

Long Island Sound.—The agreement provides \$40,502,000 for the Long Island Sound program.

South Florida. Within the funds provided, the agreement provides at least \$2,000,000 to monitor coral health in South Florida; \$1,150,000 to enhance water quality and seagrass monitoring in the Caloosahatchee Estuary and Indian River Lagoon, especially with respect to assessing the impact of Lake Okeechobee discharges and harmful algal blooms; \$1,150,000 to enhance water quality and seagrass monitoring in Florida Bay and Biscayne Bay, especially with respect to assessing the impact of Everglades Restoration projects and harmful algal blooms; and \$1,000,000 for the expansion of the water quality and ecosystem health monitoring and prediction network which will use vetted, modern procedures for long-term monitoring of Florida waters, including molecular, algal, ocean floor, and seagrasses.

Gulf of America. The Committees note that hypoxia continues to be a growing cause for concern. The Committees direct the Agency to coordinate with the Department of Agriculture, the Gulf States, and other State, local, and private partners to leverage greater resources toward conservation projects on working-lands within the Gulf Region and Mississippi River Basin. The Agency is directed to distribute funds in the same manner as fiscal year 2024.

Lake Champlain. The agreement provides \$25,500,000 for the Lake Champlain program. These funds shall be allocated through the Lake Champlain Basin Program, other than continuing the enacted levels to support significant, impactful projects identified in the State implementation plan that will make measurable progress towards meeting the phosphorus reduction targets of the EPA's 2016 Phosphorus Total Maximum Daily Load Plan for Lake Champlain.

Additionally, in carrying out the evaluation required by House Report 119-215, the Committees direct the Agency to consult with, and incorporate, feedback from impacted stakeholders.

Northwest Forest Program.—The Committees continue to support the Northwest Forest Program at not less than fiscal year 2021 funding level.

Information Exchange Outreach. Tribal capacity building is funded at not less than \$14,414,000.

Pesticide Licensing. In lieu of the directives in House Report 119-215 under the heading “Pesticide Licensing”, the agreement provides the following direction: The Committees recommend that as the Agency conducts Endangered Species Act (ESA) analyses, consistent with statutory and litigation requirements, it will consider best available data on pesticide usage, existing conservation practices, real-world studies on spray drift, ground water and surface water concentrations, and sub-county level species range maps.

Additionally, in lieu of the report required under the heading “Pesticide Licensing” in Senate Report 119-46, the agreement provides the following direction. The Committees acknowledge the Agency’s completion of the third-party audit as required by the Pesticide Registration and Review Act (PRIA 5), but note outstanding items. The Committees direct the Agency to provide quarterly briefings to the Committees regarding its resource evaluation and efforts to improve application reviews.

Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA). Of the funds provided under this program area, \$9,000,000 is for implementation of a Federal permit program for coal combustion residuals in non-participating states, as authorized under section 4005(d)(2)(B) of the Solid Waste Disposal Act (42 U.S.C. 6945(d)(2)(B)), or to provide technical assistance to states establishing their own permitting program under section 4005(d) of the Solid Waste Disposal Act (42 U.S.C. 6945(d)).

The Committees recognize cooperative federalism in implementing the Solid Waste Disposal Act (42 U.S.C. 6091 et seq.) and note federal statutory requirements for nonhazardous waste when regulating scrap metal shredding operations.

Ensure Clean Water. The Committees support the work of the WaterSense and Trash Free Waters programs and encourage the continuance of these programs.

The agreement provides up to \$2,000,000 for integrated planning activities consistent with section 402(s) of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1342(s)).

Ensure Clean Water: National Estuary Program Coastal Waterways.—The agreement provides \$40,000,000, of which the agreement provides \$850,000 per estuary for each of the 28 national estuaries in the National Estuary Program (NEP) authorized by section 320 of the Clean Water Act (Public Law 92-500). Additionally, not less than \$2,500,000 is provided for competitive grants.

Ensure Safe Water. Within available funds, the agreement provides no less than \$5,000,000 for the Agency’s continued work within the Underground Injection Control (UIC) program related to Class VI wells for geologic sequestration to help develop expertise and capacity at the Agency. These funds should be used by the Agency to expeditiously review and process Class VI permits and primacy applications from States and Tribes.

In addition, the agreement provides \$1,800,000 to support Class VI regulator education and training programs in conjunction with States or other eligible entities such as an association of States.

Additional Guidance.—The following additional guidance is included:

Agency Actions.—The Committees note the Agency's review of prior federal rulemakings related to stationary and transportation source emissions, methane and other pollutants, guidelines for oil and natural gas, and greenhouse gas reporting requirements for petroleum and natural gas systems.

Attainment.—The Committees direct the Agency to provide a briefing not later than 90 days following the enactment of this Act on the statutory requirements related to considering the impact on ozone transport when making nonattainment classification determinations.

Chemical Reviews.—In lieu of the directives in House Report 119-215 under the heading “Toxics Risk Review and Prevention” and in Senate Report 119-46 under the heading “New Chemical Submissions”, the agreement provides the following direction:

The Committees direct the Agency to meet all statutory requirements under the Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA) when reviewing new chemicals. Additionally, the Agency is directed to enhance communication, improve the transparency of the process, and communicate the status of submissions with new chemicals submitters. The Agency is directed to brief the Committees within 120 days of enactment of this Act on these efforts.

Regarding Section 9 of TSCA, the Committees direct the Agency to revise the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) to meaningfully delineate between each Agency’s role and clearly articulate the areas of collaboration between the agencies. Further, the Committees remind the Agency of the requirements in Section 9 of TSCA (15 U.S.C. 2608) related to responses from other Federal agencies.

Clean Water.—The Committees encourage the Environmental Protection Agency to review previous rules related to Clean Water Act Section 401 water quality certification and effluent limitations for meat and poultry products.

Coal Combustion Residuals.—The Committees note that the Agency is re-evaluating the final rule titled “Hazardous and Solid Waste Management System: Disposal of Coal Combustion Residuals From Electric Utilities; Legacy CCR Surface Impoundments”.

Northwest Area Contingency Plan Critical Energy Infrastructure Hub Resiliency Study.—The Committees are concerned by the potential environmental impacts from oil spills in the Columbia River Basin as a result of a potential seismic event. The Committees encourage the Agency to update the Area Contingency Plan and to collaborate with institutions of higher education and State, local, and Tribal governments to work with the community to develop earthquake resilient plans in urban areas and recommends \$1,000,000 within Ensure Clean Water program project area for this purpose.

Transboundary Watersheds.—The Committees direct the Agency to continue and expand its work coordinating with Federal, State, local, and Tribal agencies to monitor and reduce transboundary mining pollution in the Kootenai watershed and other U.S.-British Columbia transboundary watersheds. The Committees provide \$2,000,000 for such monitoring, management, and interagency activities in U.S.-British Columbia transboundary watersheds. The Committees remind the Agency of the direction in the explanatory statement accompanying Public Law 117-103 to brief the Committees on the Agency's progress to document baseline conditions and mining-related impacts, and any additional staff or resources needed for this project. The Committees direct the Agency to allocate these funds in its fiscal year 2026 operating plan to the appropriate program project area for carrying out these activities.

Small Refinery Relief.—The Committees recognize that the Renewable Fuels Standard (RFS) under Clean Air Act Section 211(o)(9) provides that the Agency may exempt small refineries from compliance with the RFS in certain circumstances and that a small refinery "may at any time petition the Administrator for an extension of the exemption for the reason of disproportionate economic hardship." The Committees direct that the Agency develop policies and procedures for making small refinery exemption decisions consistent with the findings of the impact of compliance costs on small refiners in the November 3, 2022, GAO report titled "Renewable Fuel Standard: Actions Needed to Improve Decision-Making in the Small Refinery Exemption Program".

Hydrofluorocarbons.—The resources provided include funding for the phase down of the use of hydrofluorocarbons.

Office of the Administrator.—In lieu of the direction provided under "Office of the Administrator" in Senate Report 119-46, the Committees acknowledge that the Agency published an Addendum to its fiscal year 2026 budget request related to consolidations, reorganizations, realignments, and other transfers of resources.

The bill provides \$43,250,000 for the Office of Inspector General. The bill transfers \$11,328,000 from the Hazardous Substance Superfund account to this account.

BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES

The bill provides \$40,676,000 for Buildings and Facilities.

HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCE SUPERFUND (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

The bill provides \$282,749,000 for the Hazardous Substance Superfund account and includes bill language to transfer \$11,328,000 to the Office of Inspector General account and \$17,607,000 to the Science and Technology account. The agreement provides the following additional direction:

Research: Chemical Safety and Sustainability.—The agreement provides \$5,714,000 for Research: Chemical Safety and Sustainability. The Agency is directed to include these funds as part of the transfer to the Science and Technology account.

Research: Sustainable and Healthy Communities.—The agreement provides \$11,448,000 for Research: Sustainable and Healthy Communities. The Agency is directed to include these funds as part of the transfer to the Science and Technology account.

The Committees direct the Agency to submit to the Committees on Appropriations of the Senate and the House of Representatives a report detailing the current and projected remediation needs, staffing requirements, and estimate of the latest timeline for remediating hazardous waste residing at the West Lake Landfill Superfund Site in Bridgeton, Missouri no later than 120 days after enactment of this Act.

LEAKING UNDERGROUND STORAGE TANK TRUST FUND PROGRAM

The bill provides \$88,903,000 for the Leaking Underground Storage Tank Trust Fund Program.

INLAND OIL SPILL PROGRAMS

The bill provides \$20,561,000 for Inland Oil Spill Programs.

STATE AND TRIBAL ASSISTANCE GRANTS

The bill provides \$4,409,609,000 for the State and Tribal Assistance Grants program and includes the following specific funding levels and direction:

Community Project Funding Items Congressionally Directed Spending Items.—From within funds provided for capitalization grants for the Clean Water State Revolving Fund and the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund, the bill provides \$892,762,272 from the Clean Water SRF and \$715,364,627 from the Drinking Water SRF for Community Project Funding/Congressionally Directed Spending grants for the construction of drinking water, wastewater, and stormwater infrastructure and for water quality protection.

Infrastructure Projects.—Each project shall provide not less than 20 percent matching funds from non-Federal sources, unless approved for a waiver. Applicable Federal requirements that would apply to a Clean Water State Revolving Fund or Drinking Water State Revolving Fund project grant recipient shall apply to a grantee receiving a Congressionally directed spending grant under this section. The Committees note that the following funds are to be treated as non-Federal funds and can be used to meet the non-Federal matching fund requirement: U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Community Development Block Grant Program; U.S. Department of Agriculture, Rural Development Program; Appalachian Regional Commission grants; and Delta Regional Authority grants. Funding made available to jurisdictions through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (Public Law 117-2) is considered Federal funding and may not be applied towards the non-Federal cost share requirement.

The Committees remain concerned that EPA does not have sufficient resources necessary to expeditiously implement this program and fully support recipients as they address applicable Federal grant requirements. Accordingly, the bill provides \$13,300,000 in funding for salaries, expenses, and administration for Congressionally Directed Spending and Community Project Funding grants provided in previous fiscal years and this Act. While the Committees appreciate the technical assistance the Agency has provided in recent months, the Committees remain concerned that more work is needed to resolve the Agency's significant backlog of projects, as discussed in the fiscal year 2024 Senate appropriations hearing.

Further, the Committees appreciate the Agency's engagement with the Committees regarding additional, potential solutions to help resolve the Agency's significant backlog of Congressionally Directed Spending and Community Project Funding grants. The Committees direct the Agency to identify other actions that will help obligate funding more quickly, including by adopting state environmental reviews, and to brief the Committees within 90 days of enactment of this Act on actions the Agency can take immediately and any barriers to taking additional actions. Further, the Committees direct the Agency

to provide a report within 90 days of enactment of this Act on the Congressionally Directed Spending and Community Project Funding grant funding that has not been obligated or awarded in fiscal years 2022, 2023, and 2024. The Committees remind the Agency of the Biweekly Metrics Report.

Diesel Emission Reduction Grants (DERA). The Committees continue funding for the DERA program at the enacted level.

Targeted Airshed Grants. The Committees direct the Agency to follow the directive in Senate Report 118-83.

Technical Assistance for Wastewater Treatment Works. The Agency is directed to issue awards on an annual basis to the most qualified and experienced applicants necessary to provide quality uninterrupted training and technical assistance. The Agency is directed to allocate funds to grantees within 180 days of enactment of this Act.

Wildfire Smoke Preparedness.—The bill provides \$8,500,000 for wildfire smoke preparedness grants. These grants shall be distributed on a competitive basis to States, federally recognized Tribes, public pre-schools, local educational agencies as defined in 20 U.S.C. 7801(30), and non-profit organizations, for assessment, prevention, control, or abatement of wildfire smoke hazards in community buildings, including schools as defined in 20 U.S.C. 3610(6), and related activities. The Federal share of the costs of such activities shall not exceed 90 percent except that the Administrator may waive such cost share requirement in the case of facilities located in economically distressed communities. A maximum of 25 percent of grant funding under this paragraph during this fiscal year may go to recipients in any one State. Further, the Committees direct the Agency to allow for grants to be made for research purposes, in addition to current eligibility categories.

Categorical Grants. The bill provides \$1,109,833,000 for Categorical Grants. Funding levels are specified in the table at the end of this division.

Categorical Grant: Resource Recovery and Hazardous Waste Grants.—The bill includes a provision supporting categorical grant funds for the purpose of providing grants to assist States in the development and implementation of State programs for the control of coal combustion residuals under section 2301 of the Water and Waste Act of 2016 (Public Law 114-322), and the Agency is directed to continue funding of not less than \$4,000,000 from the Hazardous Waste Financial Assistance categorical grants program project for this purpose. The Committees note that funds awarded under the authority provided by this act are not subject to section 3011 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act (Public Law 89-272).

Categorical Grant: Public Water System Supervision.—Of the funds provided, \$12,000,000 is to further support States, Territories, and Tribes in addressing PFAS and other contaminants of emerging concern as they carry out their Public Water System Supervision programs.

PEAS. The bill clarifies Congressional intent that funding provided in fiscal year 2026, including from Public Law 117-58, for grants for addressing contaminants under subsections (a) through (j) of section 1459A of the Safe Drinking Water Act (42 U.S.C. 300j-19a) may be used by a State to provide assistance to benefit one or more owners of drinking water wells that are not public water systems or connected to a public water system for necessary and appropriate activities related to a contaminant pursuant to subsection (j) of section 1459A of the Safe Drinking Water Act. In implementing this funding, the Committees direct the Agency to encourage States to prioritize beneficiaries that make less than the average household income for the State.

Use of Iron and Steel.—The bill includes language in title IV general provisions that stipulates requirements for the use of iron and steel in State Revolving Fund projects, and the agreement includes only the following guidance: the Committees acknowledge that the Agency may issue a waiver of said requirements for de minimis amounts of iron and steel building materials. The Committees emphasize that any coating processes that are applied to the external surface of iron and steel components that otherwise qualify under the procurement preference shall not render such products ineligible for the procurement preference regardless of where the coating processes occur, provided that final assembly of the products occurs in the United States.

WATER INFRASTRUCTURE FINANCE AND INNOVATION PROGRAM ACCOUNT

The agreement provides a total of \$72,274,000 for the Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) program.

ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS—ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

The bill continues several administrative provisions from previous years.

The bill includes a provision providing for further Congressional oversight.

The bill includes a provision related to hiring authority for employees with special scientific capabilities.

The bill includes a provision related to fulfilling the mission and statutory obligations of the agency.

The bill provides \$780,000 for the Office of the Under Secretary for Natural Resources and Environment.

FOREST SERVICE
FOREST SERVICE OPERATIONS
(INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

The bill provides \$1,090,600,000 for Forest Service Operations. The detailed allocation of funding by activity is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

FOREST AND RANGELAND RESEARCH

The bill provides \$308,697,000 for Forest and Rangeland Research. The detailed allocation of funding by activity is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

Research and Development. The agreement includes \$61,500,000 for Research and Development, including the following research priorities, for which funding of geographically-based items is in addition to funds otherwise provided to individual research units and therefore is not to be factored into base allocations:

—\$1,000,000 to support Remote Automated Weather Stations (RAWS) for the Forest Service and its interagency partners to conduct a coverage analysis including factors such as recent National Fire Danger Rating System upgrades and proposals to determine a more appropriate network coverage.

—\$1,000,000 for the Forest Service to utilize an existing partnership with a public research university in a fire prone, western state with proximity to the National Interagency Fire Center to develop AI-based wildfire activity forecasting and modeling tools.

—\$2,000,000 for the National Agroforestry Center.

—\$3,000,000 to the Joint Fire Science program, which combined with funding in the Department of the Interior provides \$6,000,000 in total.

University Research. The Committees reiterate support for the language included in House Report 119-215 related to partnering with a university in the South on new and existing research focusing on advancing sustainable forestry practices, innovating wood-based materials, wood testing, synthetics, and enhancing the economic impact of forest-related industries.

All funding for specific programs, directives, or congressionally directed spending identified herein is in addition to funds otherwise provided to States and regions through the formula and competitive grant process and therefore is not to be factored into those allocations.

International Programs and Trade. The Committees expect the Service to continue an intact program office reporting directly to the Chief of the Forest Service, for serving as the lead entity and coordinating all activities related to the Lacey Act and the protection of the American wood trade.

NATIONAL FOREST SYSTEM

The bill provides \$1,857,843,000 for the National Forest System. The detailed allocation of funding by activity is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

Recreation, Heritage, and Wilderness.—The agreement includes \$45,000,000 for Recreation, Heritage, and Wilderness, including \$750,000 for the maintenance of rural air strips and \$500,000 to support infrastructure and trails development.

Hazardous Fuels. The bill provides \$176,850,000 for hazardous fuels activities. Funding for the Southwest Ecological Restoration Institutes includes \$1,400,000 to create a new institute in the State of Nevada consistent with the direction in House Report 119-215.

Wildlife and Fish Habitat Management.—The agreement includes \$21,000,000 for Wildlife and Fish Habitat Management, including no less than \$2,000,000 for threatened and endangered species activities.

The bill provides \$153,250,000 for Capital Improvement and Maintenance programs.

Trails.—The agreement provides \$22,000,000 for Trails, including \$2,000,000 for trail maintenance needs within National Forests in States and territories outside the continental United States.

Construction Projects.—The bill provides \$20,850,000 for congressionally directed spending in this program. A detailed list of projects is included in the “Interior and Environment Incorporation of Community Project Funding Items/Congressionally Directed Spending Items” table accompanying this explanatory statement.

ACQUISITION OF LANDS FOR NATIONAL FORESTS SPECIAL ACTS

The bill provides \$664,000 for the Acquisition of Lands for National Forests Special Acts.

ACQUISITION OF LANDS TO COMPLETE LAND EXCHANGES

The bill provides \$150,000 for the Acquisition of Lands to Complete Land Exchanges.

RANGE BETTERMENT FUND

The bill provides \$1,719,000 for the Range Betterment Fund.

GIFTS, DONATIONS AND BEQUESTS FOR FOREST AND RANGELAND RESEARCH

The bill provides \$45,000 for Gifts, Donations and Bequests for Forest and Rangeland Research.

MANAGEMENT OF NATIONAL FOREST LANDS FOR SUBSISTENCE USES

The bill provides \$1,099,000 for the Management of National Forest Lands for Subsistence Uses.

WILDLAND FIRE MANAGEMENT (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

The bill provides \$2,426,111,000 for Forest Service Wildland Fire Management, including amounts to support continued execution of the new pay table authorized by Public Law 119-4 as a permanent fix to ensure the Federal agencies' ability to recruit and retain wildland firefighters and maintain current firefighting capacity. The detailed allocation of funding by activity is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

WILDFIRE SUPPRESSION OPERATIONS RESERVE FUND (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

The bill includes \$2,480,000,000 for the Wildfire Suppression Operations Reserve Fund.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES
INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE
INDIAN HEALTH SERVICES

The bill provides a total of \$5,054,433,000 for the Indian Health Service (IHS) Services account for fiscal year 2026, \$66,993,000 above the fiscal year 2025 enacted level, which includes \$38,493,000 to remain available until September 30, 2027 to provide for staffing of new facilities, \$74,138,000 to remain available until September 30, 2027, for the Indian Health Care Improvement Fund, and \$190,564,000, to remain available until expended, for the Electronic Health Record System.

The agreement also provides \$4,789,731,000 in advance appropriations for the Services account for fiscal year 2027 except for funding for Electronic Health Records and the Indian Health Care Improvement Fund, which continue to receive an annual appropriation. All programs, projects, and activities are maintained at fiscal year 2024 enacted levels unless otherwise specified below.

Staffing for New Facilities.— The agreement includes \$38,493,000 in Indian Health Services for staffing newly opened health facilities, which is the full amount required in fiscal year 2026 based upon updated estimates provided to the Committees. Funds for staffing of new facilities are limited to facilities funded through the Health Care Facilities Construction Priority System or the Joint Venture Construction Program that have opened in fiscal year 2025 or will open in fiscal year 2026. None of these funds may be allocated to a facility until such facility has achieved beneficial occupancy status.

The Committees understand that amounts required for staffing new facilities continue to evolve, due in part to when facilities achieve beneficial occupancy. IHS is expected to update the Committees as beneficial occupancy dates or cost estimates change.

Clinical Services.—The agreement includes a total of \$4,555,362,000 for Clinical Services. Within the total for Clinical Services, \$2,632,772,000 is provided for Hospitals and Health Clinics, including \$39,433,000 is for Tribal Epidemiology Centers, \$7,000,000 for the Produce Prescription Pilot, \$6,000,000 to continue Alzheimer's and related dementia activities, and \$8,000,000 for Improving Maternal Health.

The recommendation includes \$260,360,000 for Dental Health, including \$6,500,000 for Dental Support Centers and continues funding for Electronic Dental Health Records. Within the funds for Clinical Services, the recommendation also provides \$133,693,000 for Mental Health, which includes \$2,000,000 for a new behavioral health pilot as outlined in House Report 119-215.

The Committees emphasize the directives in Senate Report 119-46 related to Village Built Clinics, Improving Maternal Health, and Urban Indian Health.

Preventative Health. The agreement includes \$206,119,000 for Preventative Health.

Other Services. The agreement includes \$292,952,000 for Other Services, including \$84,568,000 for Indian Health Profession which supports \$53,000,000 for the Loan Repayment Program. The Committees reiterate concern about the tax assessments associated with the Loan Repayment Program and remind the Service of the reporting directive included in House Report 119-215.

The Committees also emphasize the directive in House Report 119-215 related to the allocation of funds across Indian Health Professions as well as regarding IHS collaboration with Veterans Affairs and the Health Resources and Service Administration on graduate medical education and bringing opportunities to Tribal communities.

CONTRACT SUPPORT COSTS

The bill provides an indefinite appropriation to fully fund contract support costs, which are estimated to be \$1,819,000,000 in fiscal year 2026.

PAYMENTS FOR TRIBAL LEASES

The bill provides an indefinite appropriation to fully fund payments for Tribal leases, which are estimated to be \$366,000,000 in fiscal year 2026.

INDIAN HEALTH FACILITIES

The bill provides \$809,222,000 for Indian Health Facilities. The agreement provides \$516,600,000 in advance appropriations for this account for fiscal year 2027 except for funding for Sanitation Facilities Construction and Health Care Facilities Construction for which \$292,622,000 is provided as an annual appropriation in recognition of the project-based nature of those accounts.

Staffing for New Facilities.—The agreement provides \$3,826,000 for staffing newly opened health facilities, which is the full amount based upon updated estimates provided to the Committees. Funds for staffing of new facilities are limited to facilities funded through the Health Care Facilities Construction Priority System or Joint Venture Construction Program that have opened in fiscal year 2025 or will open in fiscal year 2026. Further, the stipulations included in the “Indian Health Services” account regarding the allocation of funds pertain to this account as well.

The Committees understand that amounts required for staffing new facilities continue to evolve, due in part to when facilities achieve beneficial occupancy. IHS is expected to update the Committees as beneficial occupancy dates or cost estimates change.

Sanitation Facilities Construction. The agreement provides \$107,943,000 for Sanitation Facilities Construction. The agreement also includes \$17,039,000 for congressionally directed spending [CDS] projects from within funds as shown on the table titled “Interior and Environment Incorporation of Community Project Funding Items/Congressionally Directed Spending Items” accompanying this explanatory statement.

Health Care Facilities Construction. The agreement includes \$184,679,000, including \$13,000,000 for staff quarters for staff housing across the IHS health care delivery system to support the recruitment and retention of quality healthcare professionals across Indian country. The Committees reiterate the reporting directive related to housing quarters in Senate Report 119-46.

Equipment. The agreement provides \$34,598,000 for Equipment, including \$5,000,000 to purchase generators, and reminds the Service of the directive in House Report 119-215 related to determining the most cost-effective method for procuring backup generators.

NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH
NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH SCIENCES

The agreement provides \$77,100,000 for the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences. The Committees continue the \$2,000,000 provided in fiscal year 2024 to further the Institute's work on PFAS and other contaminants of emerging concern. Further, of the funds provided, not less than \$1,750,000 shall be to support risk reduction for Native Americans to hazardous metals mixtures from abandoned uranium mine waste.

AGENCY FOR TOXIC SUBSTANCES AND DISEASE REGISTRY
TOXIC SUBSTANCES AND ENVIRONMENTAL PUBLIC HEALTH

The agreement provides \$79,800,000. The Committees continue the \$2,000,000 provided in fiscal year 2024 to further the Agency's work on PFAS and other contaminants of emerging concern.

The agreement continues funding as specified in Senate Report 119-46.

The agreement provides \$4,629,000 for the Council on Environmental Quality and Office of Environmental Quality.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The bill provides \$14,000,000 for the Chemical Safety and Hazard Investigation Board.

INSTITUTE OF AMERICAN INDIAN AND ALASKA NATIVE CULTURE
AND ARTS DEVELOPMENT
PAYMENT TO THE INSTITUTE

The bill provides \$13,482,000 for academic programs of the Institute of American Indian Arts.

SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTION
SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The agreement provides a total of \$1,080,500,000 for all Smithsonian Institution accounts, of which \$928,500,000 is provided for salaries and expenses. A detailed allocation of funding is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

FACILITIES CAPITAL

The bill provides \$152,000,000 for Facilities Capital.

NATIONAL GALLERY OF ART
SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The bill provides \$185,000,000 for the Salaries and Expenses account of the National Gallery of Art, of which not to exceed \$3,893,000 is for the special exhibition program. The distribution of funds among the Gallery's various activities is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

REPAIR, RESTORATION AND RENOVATION OF BUILDINGS

The bill provides \$19,000,000 for the Repair, Restoration and Renovation of Buildings account and includes authority to repurpose certain prior-year amounts.

JOHN F. KENNEDY CENTER FOR THE PERFORMING ARTS
OPERATIONS AND MAINTENANCE

The bill provides \$32,340,000 for the Operations and Maintenance account.

CAPITAL REPAIR AND RESTORATION

The bill provides \$4,860,000 for the Capital Repair and Restoration account.

WOODROW WILSON INTERNATIONAL CENTER FOR SCHOLARS
SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The bill provides \$5,000,000 for the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars. The Committees direct the Center to maintain a proper capacity of fellows to ensure this Federal investment results in the research, counsel, insight, and publications outlined in its mission.

NATIONAL FOUNDATION ON THE ARTS AND THE HUMANITIES
NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE ARTS
GRANTS AND ADMINISTRATION

The bill provides \$207,000,000 for the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) to continue the important work of the Endowment. A detailed breakdown of the funding allocation is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE HUMANITIES
GRANTS AND ADMINISTRATION

The bill provides \$207,000,000 for the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) to continue the important work of the Endowment. A detailed breakdown of the funding allocation is included in the table accompanying this explanatory statement.

COMMISSION OF FINE ARTS
SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The bill provides \$3,641,000 for the Commission of Fine Arts.

NATIONAL CAPITAL ARTS AND CULTURAL AFFAIRS

The bill provides \$5,000,000 for the National Capital Arts and Cultural Affairs program.

ADVISORY COUNCIL ON HISTORIC PRESERVATION
SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The bill provides \$8,285,000 for the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation.

NATIONAL CAPITAL PLANNING COMMISSION
SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The bill provides \$8,750,000 for the National Capital Planning Commission, including funding for lease costs.

UNITED STATES HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL MUSEUM
HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL MUSEUM

The bill provides \$65,231,000 for the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. The Committees continue not less than \$2,000,000 for implementation of the Never Again Education Act (Public Law 116-141).

UNITED STATES SEMIQUINCENTENNIAL COMMISSION
SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The bill provides \$15,000,000 for the United States Semiquincentennial Commission.

**TITLE IV—GENERAL PROVISIONS
(INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)**

The bill includes various legislative provisions in Title IV of the bill. The provisions are:

Section 401 continues a provision providing that appropriations available in the bill shall not be used to produce literature or otherwise promote public support of a legislative proposal on which legislative action is not complete.

Section 402 continues a provision providing for annual appropriations unless expressly provided otherwise in this Act.

Section 403 continues a provision providing restrictions on departmental assessments unless approved by the Committees on Appropriations.

Section 404 continues a limitation on accepting and processing applications for patents and on the patenting of Federal lands.

Section 405 continues a provision regarding the payment of contract support costs.

Section 406 addresses the payment of contract support costs for fiscal year 2026.

Section 407 continues a provision providing that the Secretary of Agriculture shall not be considered in violation of certain provisions of the Forest and Rangeland Renewable Resources Planning Act solely because more than 15 years have passed without revision of a forest plan, provided that the Secretary is working in good faith to complete the plan revision.

Section 408 continues a provision limiting preleasing, leasing, and related activities within the boundaries of National Monuments.

Section 409 restricts funding appropriated for acquisition of land or interests in land from being used for declarations of taking or complaints in condemnation.

Section 410 continues a provision which prohibits no-bid contracts.

Section 411 continues a provision which requires public disclosure of certain reports.

Section 412 continues a provision which delineates the grant guidelines for the National Endowment for the Arts.

Section 413 continues a provision which delineates the program priorities for the programs managed by the National Endowment for the Arts.

Section 414 requires the Department of the Interior, Environmental Protection Agency, Forest Service and Indian Health Service to provide the Committees on Appropriations quarterly reports on the status of balances of appropriations.

Section 415 extends certain authorities allowing the Forest Service to renew grazing permits.

Section 416 prohibits the use of funds to maintain or establish a computer network unless such network is designed to block access to pornography websites.

Section 417 addresses the humane transfer and treatment of excess wild horses and burros.

Section 418 extends the authority of the Forest Service Facility Realignment and Enhancement Act.

Section 419 sets requirements for the use of American iron and steel for certain loans and grants.

Section 420 provides authority for the Secretary of the Interior to enter into training agreements and to transfer excess equipment and supplies for wildfires.

Section 421 incorporates Reprogramming Guidelines into the Act.

Section 422 continues a provision authorizing the Secretary of the Interior and the Secretary of Agriculture to consider local contractors when awarding contracts for certain activities on public lands.

Section 423 extends the authority for the Interpretive Association for one year.

Section 424 extends the authority for Forest Botanical Products fee collection for one year.

Section 425 includes certain limitations on oil and gas development near Chaco Culture National Historical Park.

Section 426 requires 105(l) Tribal lease payments to begin no earlier than the date the lease proposal is submitted and for the Federal agencies to consult with Tribes on lease requirements.

Section 427 extends the authority for the Forest Ecosystem Health and Recovery Fund by one year.

Section 428 requires the allocation of funds from the National Parks and Public Land Legacy Restoration Fund and Land and Water Conservation Fund.

Section 429 addresses carbon emissions from forest biomass.

Section 430 addresses the use of small remote incinerators in the State of Alaska.

Section 431 addresses timber sales involving Alaska western red and yellow cedar.

Section 432 provides transfer authority to the Federal Highway Administration for the National Parks and Public Land Legacy Restoration Fund.

Section 433 continues a provision prohibiting the use of funds to promulgate or implement any regulation requiring the issuance of permits under Title V of the Clean Air Act for carbon dioxide, nitrous oxide, water vapor, or methane emissions.

Section 434 continues a provision prohibiting the use of funds to implement any provision in a rule if that provision requires mandatory reporting of greenhouse gas emissions from manure management systems.

Section 435 continues a provision prohibiting the use of funds to regulate the lead content of ammunition or fishing tackle.

Section 436 provides for wildland firefighter pay cap waiver.

Section 437 extends authorization for Alaska Native regional health entities.

Section 438 requires the Secretary of the Interior, acting through the Bureau of Land Management, to have analyzed, in consultation with local elected officials and stakeholders, action alternatives designed to reduce impacts prior to expending any funds to grant, issue, or renew a right-of-way for the Lava Ridge Wind Project.

Section 439 modifies the Wildfire Funding and Forest Management Act to extend the reporting requirement timeline from 90 days to 180 days and to require an accounting of all spending in the first two quarters of the succeeding fiscal year attributable to suppression operations in the report year.

Section 440 requires updated 5-year deferred maintenance plans from DOI and the Forest Service.

Section 441 requires quarterly disaster estimates.

Section 442 requires continued operation of the Smithsonian American Women's History Museum and the National Museum of the American Latino.

Section 443 incorporates program funding by reference.

Section 444 repurposes certain funds provided in Public Law 117-58.

Section 445 extends a provision mandating the exhaustion of administrative review through 2027.

Section 446 provides technical corrections to fiscal year 2026 projects.
